WEEKLY REFLECTION

"Jesus Meek and Humble of Heart, make our hearts like your heart". This powerful statement should always make us think harder about its meaning and it should challenge our faith daily. It is said that humility is not fear. Meekness is not weakness. Humility and meekness are indeed spiritual powers and gifts. The salvation of this human world lies nowhere else than in the human heart, in the human power to reflect, in human meekness and human responsibility. It is one of the most difficult things to attain for me personally.

In Zechariah 9:9, Jesus presents Himself in the Gospel, meek and humble of heart. Meek means to be patient and gentle. It is not renouncing of rights but the opposite of today's world of anger, division and of long embraced retribution. If we take a minute to reflect, it is crazy that Jesus Christ, the savior, chose to come down from Heaven and be with us in this crazy world, as a servant to all. In a world where we're appealed to focus on making the best name for ourselves, but God has given us His only Son, the intact example of putting others' needs above our own. Humility is defined in the dictionary as freedom from pride or arrogance, the quality or state of being humble.

The other day I read a quote stating that "I am in competition with no one. I have no desire to play the game of being better than anyone. I am trying to be better than the person I was yesterday". Life is not a competition but a character. If there's anyone to compete with it should be yourself alone. The only competition we have is the person we see in the mirror every morning. We are not in a race with any other individual or situation except with ourselves. Therefore, how can I be a better person today than yesterday? Michael Josephson wrote this beautiful poem about what will matter in life, and it is very fitting when discussing being meek and humble of heart:

Ready or not, some day it will all come to an end. There will be no more sunrises, no minutes, hours or days. Your wealth, fame and power will shrivel to irrelevance. Your grudges, resentments, frustrations and jealousies will finally disappear. So too, your hopes, ambitions, plans and tolists will do expire. The wins and losses that once seemed so important will fade away. It will not matter where you came from or what side of the track you lived on in the end. It will not matter whether you were beautiful or brilliant.

Even your gender and skin color will be irrelevant. So, what will matter? How will the value of your days be measured? What will matter is not what you bought, but what you built, not what you got, but what you gave. What will matter is not your success, but your significance.

What will matter is not what you learned but what you taught. What will matter is every act of integrity, compassion, courage or sacrifice that enriched. empowered or encouraged others to emulate your example. What will matter is not your competence, but your character. What will matter is not how many people you knew but how many will feel a lasting loss when you're gone. What will matter is not your memories but the memories of those who loved you. What will matter is how long you will be remembered, by whom and for what. Living a life that matters doesn't happen by accident.

It's not a matter of circumstance but of

choice. Choose to live a life that matters.' Colin Smith provided the following strategies for cultivating meekness of heart: Moderate your expectations of others. Find joy in evidence of God's grace. Remember how much you have been forgiven. Take time before you form judgments. Make friends with meek people. Take pleasure in the joys of others. Discern God's hand in the work of your enemies. Walk daily in fellowship with Jesus Christ. Anticipate all that God has promised. Ask God to give you meekness. Lord, you said that a gentle and quiet spirit is of great worth in your sight. Please give me that spirit. Help me to curb this harsh tongue. Keep me from rash judgments and help me to think the best of others.


Help me to discern your hand working for my good, even when I face great difficulties, opposition and sometimes wounds. Help me to find pleasure in the joy of others. Help me to walk with Jesus Christ, so that a reflection of your meek Son, Jesus Christ, may be formed in me today and everyday of my life so tomorrow I can be a better person than yesterday, and help my heart become like the heart of your only begotten son, Jesus Christ.

Three Maronite brothers -Francis, Raphael and Abdel Moati Massabki - grew up and lived in 19th century Damascus, then part of the Ottoman Empire. They were laymen who lived ordinary, devout Christian

On 9 July 1860, during an Ottoman attack on a Franciscan Church in Damascus, the three brothers were given the chance to renounce their faith and convert or die.

All three chose to profess Jesus Christ for eternal life. Later that night they were martyred along with eight Franciscan Friars. On 7 October 1926, Pope Pius XI beatified the three brothers.

approved the canonisation of the Massabki brothers and the Friars, to take place on Sunday 20 October 2024 in the Vatican

Their feast day is 10 July.




